## Licensing and Credentialing as of 2013:

- Eleven undergraduate students completed the teacher's certification exam for Family and Consumer Sciences Education with a passing rate of 100% for the last 5 years.
- Didactic Program in Dietetics (DPD) undergraduate students with completed coursework in FCS and with an offsite internship had a passing rate of 90% on the Registration Dietician Exam. (Academy of Nutrition & dietetics (AND)/ Accreditation Council for the Education of Nutrition and Dietetics (ACEND)) for the last 5 years.
- The ServSafe Exam taken by FCS students have a passing rate of 87.8% for the last 3 years. (2011-2013)
